Jump Jam


What a big year it has been for our Year 5-6 Jump Jam team. This year we "jumped" back onto our Jump Jam journey after our amazing coach and Kaiako Chris Meehan retired from Ashley Rakahuri

School. With big shoes to fill, we decided to start with one Year 5-6 Strictly Team. As you already know we came away with a first-place title in the Jump Jam Strictly Freshman category. Because of our scores, we were then invited to compete in the Year 5-6 Challenge category at Nationals. For a lot of the team, this was their 2nd time ever performing at a Jump Jam competition- twice in one year! There was a lot of tough competition, who had been preparing all year for Nationals from around the South Island. We didn't get the win this time around but walked away with 3 Excellence Certificates including; Costuming, Presentation and, Technical Execution. We previously were awarded Merit for our technical execution and scored 3rd place in this marking area, which the team should be very proud of. PB4L

This year has been a big year of learning for myself and kaiako in regards to Positive Behaviour for Learning and Behaviour procedures within the school. Last year after a lot of work we were finally able to begin our Tier 2 training for PB4L. One piece of feedback was If possible, consider co-opting a kaiako from the senior school so that there is across-school representation on the PB4L team. This will also ensure that if there are team changes in the future, the considerable amount of mahi that has gone into PB4L systems and supports is maintained. Therefore John Lynskey joined me on the course as a representative from the senior school. Our Tier 2 training continues next year and we have already presented what we have already learnt to staff. Tier 2 is about the behaviours which are bubbling up and recorded multiple times in etap as minor behaviours. It focuses on how we can support these students and their kaiako with new strategies which will allow them and those around them to learn, feel safe in their environment and be emotionally regulated. This is on top of what we are already doing in Tier 1 such as REACH assemblies, sharing our focuses with the community, meeting with whānau, class agreements, circle time, zones of regulation, restorative practice, REACH reflections, re-teaching expected behaviours and many more strategies in our kete. I look forward to continuing my PB4L journey in 2024 and sharing with you what is happening for PB4L at Ashley Rakahuri School. Julie McDonald

Beginning in term 3 and continuing into Term 4 a number of staff and Board of Trustees members have taken on the task of working on their Te Reo knowledge and tikanga practice by enrolling in 'Te ahu o te Reo' - a course for anyone working within an education setting that provides instruction and support in learning te reo.

In Term 4 the junior school (Manuka and Harakeke) continued to participate in our Kapa Haka programme - learning a number of waiata including waiata-a-ringa (action songs) and a haka. The whole school will be performing at the End of Year Prizegiving.

In 2024 we are establishing two new leadership roles/opportunities for our seniors - that is the role of Kaitātaki. Kaitātaki a leader, usually associated with Kapa haka but for our context these tamariki will lead the Kapa haka group, assisting with organisation, discipline and leadership, they will also sit on the school council where they will keep a Te Aō/Te Reo lens on all things happening and assist with all sorts of activities in and around the school.
