# **Term 2 Updates from Around the School**

#### Whānau House Leaders

This has been a fantastic Term for our Whānau Leaders, what a great group of students we are lucky to have at this school. Following on from our GRIP leadership course last term I have been running workshops with the whānau leaders on a Wednesday afternoon to support them in their leadership roles and what it means to be a leader. So far we have looked at how to begin a meeting with something positive, and what strengths they bring to the whānau group and their individual houses e.g. organisation, public speaking, relationship building, sports and having a range of talents is a good thing. We have also looked at manageable goal setting and reviewing. We have furthermore reviewed the GRIP heading of Stepping in: Making school a better and safer place for all- not necessarily monetary value. The students have great reachable goals they would like to achieve by the time they finish the year- we discussed the idea of leaving a legacy when moving to secondary school. We examined our ideas and categorised them into short-term and long-term goals. It was great to see the whānau leaders put their hands up to take on a goal which was a big step forward for some.

Another part of our workshops has been talking about the expectations of a leader, representing the students who voted for them and the challenges that they may face as a leader e.g. friendships and doing the right thing even if our peers are not.

We also focused on the concept of stepping out: This means stepping out of your comfort zone to try new things and Stepping Closer- building new relationships within the school.

Not only have the students been attending these workshops, but they have also been running our whānau house session with support from our kaiako and then rolling solo on their Matariki sessions. This included working together to form an idea to work with 40 students, sourcing materials needed, arranging a time to meet with their whānau kaiako and then running the sessions and tidying afterwards! Phew!

I have really enjoyed working with this group this term they are so awesome and it is no wonder they were voted in by their peers. Watch this space for more exciting challenges and activities next Term!

#### PB4L

It has been another busy term for our PB4L (Positive Behaviour for Learning) systems as we look at reviewing/designing our new behaviour matrix which we hope to share with you soon. #### Enviro School Term 2

During Term 2 we have been working on looking around our kura to find problems that need solutions and actions. As a group we are trying to work on becoming more aware of our surroundings and using the knowledge we are learning within our time with Mrs Taylor exploring the principles of Enviroschools. We are working on implementing this knowledge to guide us when deciding on what we need to focus on. As a facilitator I am trying to encourage the children to use their own thinking rather than me deciding on what action we are going to take.

The students have been concerned again with the amount of packaging we are finding around the school. They decided that we needed to create some posters to put into the REACH assemblies with pictures of what the school grounds are looking like with the rubbish lying around. The tamariki also talked about making sure whānau know about ways to reduce packaging ie. lunch boxes, containers and beeswax wraps. They are going to send these out into our newsletters and onto seesaw.

We also took some time to walk around our kura to notice the areas that are problematic and consider why this may be? The tamariki discussed this and noticed that there was also a lot of half eaten fruit left in the playground. We then talked about getting our compost bins back up and running but we decided there needs to be more education around what is allowed in these etc. The enviro team will be visiting classrooms over the next few weeks to share this with the classes.

It is neat to have such an enthusiastic bunch of tamariki who are passionate about creating a sustainable kura for the future. We hope everyone can jump aboard our waka of change!


